Tommy Montgomery

Pisco Brandy, Luxardo, Pineapple Juice, Lime Juice

A take on the Pisco Punch a San Francisco original that was invented by Duncan Nicol the owner of the Bank Exchange in the late 1800's. The bar was located on the corner of Montgomery and Washington streets where the Transamerica building now stands. When Duncan invented the drink he used a 16th century Brandy, brought from Pisco, Peru during the California Gold Rush.

Emperor Norton

Stoli orange, Amaretto, organic pomegranate juice

The self-proclaimed "His Imperial Majesty" Emperor Norton I, was a celebrated, colorful citizen of San Francisco. He is depicted in the Sotomayer murals in Maxfield's Restaurant along with other famous San Francisco personalities.

Happy Valley

Basil Hayden's, Sandaman's F. reserve port,
maple syrup, angostura bitters

A neighborhood in old San Francisco and the name of the Palace Hotel bar in the 70's, The Happy Valley pays tribute to both the history of San Francisco and the Palace Hotel.

The Ralston / Sharon

Splash of orange juice, brandy, cognac,
cointreau, sweet & sour

Without this dynamic duo there would be no Palace Hotel. A combination of two classics to create a drink that is as unforgettable as the Palace itself.

The Charlie Chaplin

Absinthe, rye whiskey, Dubonnet, honey,
pischard bitters

Orange bitters, sweet vermouth,
rye whiskey, champagne

A tribute to the Palace Hotel's very first bartender

Green Goddess

Oronoco Rum, Cointreau, Hendrick's Gin, fresh lime juice, cucumber puree, White Cranberry Juice
In 1923 the Palace chef created the famous Green Goddess dressing in honor of actor George Arliss who was starring in the Green Goddess play. Today our historic past is the inspiration for this refreshing cocktail.

Lady in Red

Belvedere, cranberry, Chambord

A drink worthy of the Palace Hotel's most spirited visitor. Many claim to have seen the ghost of the Lady in Red, even before drinking this delicious cocktail.
